




The Teacher

A teacher may say aloud to students, "Mistakes help your brain grow!," but then in the next breath that same teacher might praise rapid responses from students instead of allowing for sufficient wait time. Here, students could discern the teacher prefers a fast response and does not place value on grappling with tough questions or making mistakes.

Dr. Katie Martin - Altitude Learning

Another example: if a teacher intervenes quickly when a student is struggling to reply to a question (with the positive intention of helping that student to save face in front of peers), the student could discern the teacher actually has a low estimation of her or his ability.


